Albert Tam's Lemon Curd

These are the ingredients for the basic recipe:

1/2 cup fresh strained lemon juice (about 3 lemons)

- 1 Tablespoon finely grated fresh lemon zest, mildly packed into the measuring spoon
- 1/2 cup minus 1 1/2 Tablespoons sugar
- 3 large eggs, well beaten
- ³/₄ stick (6 tablespoons) unsalted cold butter

For the tea party, I quadrupled the recipe:

2 cups lemon juice (I used lemons from Sam Hebert's garden.)

- 4 Tablespoons. lemon zest
- 1 1/2 cups plus 2 Tablespoons sugar (I used Trader Joe's organic cane sugar. Those sugar grains seem bigger than grains of white sugar such as C&H so I believe the lemon curd is less sweet.)

12 large eggs (I used Trader Joe's.)

3 sticks unsalted cold butter

Step 1 Whisk together strained lemon juice, zest, sugar, and beaten eggs in a 2-quart heavy saucepan or top of a double boiler. Cook on low flame, stirring constantly with the whisk. Slowly raising the temperature keeps the eggs from curdling (scrambled eggs). This takes a while. Slow cooking is best and do not overcook. In other words, do not let the lemon curd boil. The Lemon curd is done cooking when it thickens to a light sauce.

Step 2 Turn off the heat. Stir in butter with the whisk, a few tablespoons at a time.

Step 3 Transfer lemon curd to a glass or plastic container or bowl, its surface covered with plastic wrap. Chill until cold, at least 1 hour, but better overnight. The oils from the zest infuse the lemon curd the longer it is in the refrigerator making it taste more lemony.

Curd can be made ahead and chilled for up to 1 week.



Good Weather Makes Good Bowling

We are well into March and can look forward to some better weather, which makes bowling more enjoyable. So forget the winter "blues" and get back on the green. Maintenance work will have started on the green on Monday, March 11, so the green will be closed for a short period of time.

However the City have said they will be removing excess sand from the green so, hopefully, it should be possible to bowl again within a few days. Watch for an announcement to say when bowling can start again.

I hope many of you attended our skills day to sharpen up your game as a new season begins. The more you bowl the more consistent your game will become so give bowling priority and get out more frequently. Wishing you all a great bowling year.

The Dream of a 2nd Green

When Elizabeth F. Gamble died in 1981, she deeded her 2.31 acre property to the City of Palo Alto. According to her will, it was given "without restriction or condition of any kind or character," although she "suggested" that if the property was sold, the proceeds "be used for the benefit of the older citizens of Palo Alto."

Thus, the City Council found itself legally free to choose any use (or uses) it deemed appropriate. At least nine different proposals were considered. These ranged from subdividing the entire property into nine separate building lots and selling them off, to keeping the garden as it is and turning the property into a Garden Center.

A number of hybrid alternatives were also considered, such as reducing the size of the garden and building senior housing on the rest, or turning the Carriage House into an Arts Center. Might the Gamble House become a B&B, or youth hostel?

Our lawn bowls club, Gamble's next-door neighbor, approached the City with a proposal of its own.

On September 3, 1981, President Herb Deckert wrote the City Council a letter requesting the city to donate "less than one quarter of the land area of the Gamble property for a second green." He envisioned it being located on the Churchill Ave. side, replacing the Carriage House, a parking lot, and part of what is now the enclosed rose garden. The green would measure roughly 140 by 100 feet.

He argued that the club had added 60 members in 1980 and now had 132 members, only 48 of whom could play at any one time. Furthermore, one green could be used while the other was closed for maintenance. He pointed out that Berkeley had two greens, while Santa Barbara had four. He suggests that a second green would be "compatible to the wishes of Miss Gamble," and goes on to say that "when Miss Gamble was in good health, she en-

joyed coming to the green to watch the bowling."

For their part, the Planning Commission remained unconvinced. Their staff report notes that "the addition of a second lawn bowls [green] would require demolition or relocation of the Carriage House." It would also reduce space for parking and concludes, "the adverse effects on the Garden Center appear great,



given the limited public benefit to be derived.

Needless to say, a second green was never built or even seriously considered. In early 1985, then club president Harvey Hill along with his wife Marion (a former president of the Garden Club and life member of the same) made one final pitch for a second green. Hill notes that bowling is a sport ideally suited to older people. "We want to emphasize, too, that a bowling green is a perfect adjunct to a garden—indeed a part of a garden, as people who drive along Embarcadero often comment."

So here's a brief history. The games were organized about 20 years ago in order to provide a *social* tournament for all members, from new to been-around-for-a-while, of the six South Bay clubs—Palo Alto, Sunnyvale, San Jose, Santa Clara, Carmel Del Mesa, and Santa Cruz—to get to know each other. It also gave bowlers a chance to visit other clubs and try their hands at adjusting to the intricacies of different greens.

The games are played on the 2nd and 4th Wednesdays of April, May, and June. We play two games each day, one before lunch (bring your own) and one after. We play 12-end games as either triples or pairs, depending on the number of entries. Teams are formed by a random draw, trying to be sure that the teams are mixed with members of different clubs. The cost is a only \$5 for the whole day!
